- 1 Identify the Subject The diligent student
- 2 Identify the Verb revised
- 3 Identify the Object her essay
- 4 Identify any Complements None in this sentence
- 5 Identify the Modifiers diligent known for her exceptional writing skills carefully before submitting it to the professor

By breaking down the sentence into its core components we can clearly understand its structure and meaning. Note that the phrase known for her exceptional writing skills is a participial phrase acting as a modifier but we don't need to label it with a complex grammatical term to understand its function.

Beyond the Basics Incorporating Phrase and Clause Analysis

While our minimalist approach prioritizes core sentence elements, understanding phrases and clauses can enhance your analysis. A phrase is a group of related words without a subject and verb, while a clause contains a subject and verb. Recognising these can help you understand how modifiers and other elements contribute to the overall sentence structure. For example, in our sample sentence, before submitting it to the professor is a subordinate clause modifying the verb revised. However, even a basic identification of its function within the sentence is enough to enhance our comprehension.
